COMMENTS:

Tori says: WZZA has been paying homage to local Black History Makers of the Shoals. Each year someone will call to ask us to add a new name (or challenge a name that had been previously submitted of someone who may have not actually been the first to do a thing) so we update it annually. This month we're honoring the ladies during Women's History Month. Our WZZA website is paying tribute to the one and only Reverend Jesse Jackson. WZZA Radio founders Bob Carl and Odessa Bailey supported the Reverend Jesse Jackson during his 1984 and 1988 national Presidential campaigns by organizing local volunteers and holding events to help fund the "Run Jesse Run" campaign (including dances at local clubs with entry fees going to the campaign). After being appointed as the Deputy Youth Coordinator for the 5th Congressional District, I was later elected as a delegate to the Democratic National Convention. The Reverend Jesse Jackson singlehandedly inspired more individuals to become registered voters and paved the way for our first Black president, Barack Obama, to successfully achieve that goal. Jackson continued his fight for justice and equality across the nation. In 2007, WZZA Radio aired a series titled "Keep Hope Alive with Jesse Jackson". And in 2016, when the NAACP Alabama State Conference held a Gala in Montgomery as part of activities surrounding the 50th Anniversary of the crossing of the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, I was honored to emcee the event and I asked the Reverend Jackson to make a few remarks. He was as dynamic and as riveting as always, inspiring the attendees to remember to "keep hope alive". Tori
