Tori says: Given what's been happening in our nation, it was interesting to hear the national NAACP head asking athletes, particularly Black athletes, to basically participate in a sports boycott in those states that are redrawing the lines to prevent Black people from representing us in government. The question is whether the same sustained togetherness that resulted in the eventual success of the Montgomery Bus Boycott can be replicated today. Do our folks have the will to make sacrifices? Do white folks have the courage to speak out and risk being ostracized by their own family, neighbors, and church members? I guess we'll just have to see. In the meantime, Buddy Guy is performing in Florence on May 27th and is being presented with the Congressman John Lewis civil rights award by the brother and nephew of the Congressman. It should be interesting to see whether this moment can be used for good. I watched Green Book and was reminded that too often Black folks are encouraged to perform (music or sports) but not to express opinions (or, as shown in the movie, to eat in certain restaurants). We must all take the power that we have seriously and use it responsibly. It's about more than voting, or even protesting. Each of us has a sphere of influence and it would be good if we used it for positive change. A'ight now. Preaching's over. Tori
